



The Language of Fear Greg and Sue Smith, CBF Field Personnel



Counting ... pointing ... identifying.

"You" and "you" and "you" — "You're all going to be deported! You're all going back home where you belong!", cried the older boy, grinning and laughing at the brown and black faces exiting the school bus for their first class. Mocking and scaring the "guilty" to tears, he seemed to feel no shame.

Do we?

The day after being singled out by the schoolyard bully, one of those tanned, dark faces missed school. His friends were all in shock – "Did he really get deported?" As it turned out, the missing child stayed home to nurse a cold, and there was no immediate deportation. But for immigrant students and their American friends,

deportation suddenly had a new meaning when applied to one of their friends and fellow classmates.

When we turn on the news and hear insults that demean and degrade our immigrant, refugee and international neighbors, we may personally feel sad or even sorry for these neighbors of ours. But — and remember some of these are our Christian sisters and brothers — what they feel is oftentimes gripping terror and utter confusion that quickly can lead to panic, depression and isolation. That children's rhyme we've all said a hundred times — "Sticks and stones may break my bones but names will never hurt me" — is absolute rubbish. Names, words and phrases spoken in anger — even in careless jest — break worse than bones. They have the real power to break the spirit, crush the soul and ignite terror in the heart.

So where does that leave you and me? How do we practice both the Golden Rule ("Do unto others as you would have them do unto you") and the Great Commandments ("Love the Lord your God... and love your neighbor as you love yourself")?

For one thing, we should tone down the rhetoric if we find ourselves guilty of hurtful words. We could go out of our way to tell our immigrant, refugee and international friends that we value and love them. We might thank God for the diversity with which he blesses us all. We could even pray God's mercy and grace for us all when the wrong seems right and the right is hard to find.

Or better yet, we can do our best to be Jesus to those whom Jesus loved and for whom Jesus died.

We love the framed photos of Karen and me working with the children. The American Chestnut coffee table hand crafted by Craig Jacobs and his "associates" from the same wood as the cross displayed in our sanctuary shall be a cherished story piece in our house. In the card that you presented us was a very generous check as another parting gift. So divine was the choral anthem, "An Expression of Gratitude," at the conclusion of the worship service. Thank you is not enough. We love you and feel loved by you.

My father was in the United States Air Force, then answered God's call to serve as a Baptist pastor. Both of these ways of serving and earning income required a lot of moving and leaving for our family when I was a child. Prior to Orange Baptist Church I have left 4 other good congregations and one denominational position. I have moved and left a lot of times, have lived in six states, have attended schools in five of those states, and have resided at 24 different addresses.

I shared with Alan, our pastor, that I have never allowed myself to grieve too much when leaving. It is a way of avoiding much of the pain of separating from cherished friends and familiar places. There is some grief in leaving as pastor of you good folks at Orange Baptist Church.

Nonetheless, Karen and I are certain that God has led us to this decision which assures us that leaving now as pastor and wife is the right thing for us, and for you. We leave you with overwhelming gratefulness to God for the privilege of serving alongside you for ten years. I have served the longest among you than any one of the previous ministries.

What a joy it has been to work in God's service alongside Alan, Melinda, and Danielle. You have a very dedicated staff who bring their best to the Lord's work here at OBC and to our community.

You are a healthy congregation. Among my colleagues in ministry I have often commented on the depth and quality of leadership here. You are exceptionally gifted in music. I know you shall always give that primary consideration as you move forward. Alan is the right pastor to help you live into the special way God has formed you.

God is still calling Karen and me to serve Him. We are listening for God's voice to lead us to our next places of service. We are glad that we will be serving God each day living in the Town of Orange. We look forward to seeing you, dear friends, at the gas stations, the grocery store, in restaurants, and while walking and serving in this little town.

May a holy vision for God's good creation call us forward, one that gives us purpose each day. Every day God gives us is another day granted to bring heaven to earth. As Jesus taught us to pray, "Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven."
