## ENCOURAGER CHURCH PARTNER GREG & SUE SMITH



A while back, the big news in immigration was the influx of Central American Minors, young people coming to the US and requesting asylum, fleeing gangs and violence.

The director of a local school in El Salvador gives us a glimpse into the other side of the story. In 2016, the school saw approximately 3-5 students per class leave school, headed to an unknown but safer life in the US. "Our school tries to be a safe haven, an escape for the kids from the violence of their neighborhoods, but they have to go home each day. It's not enough," said the director. It's a beautiful school where the students have created planters from recycled soda bottles, filled with beautiful flowers. Before the first day of school, the older students purchased paint and painted the entire school in royal blue and white. It's a bright, cheery place where they grow vegetables, have access to computers, and learn to make pizza and decorate cakes in addition to their regular classes.

The decisions to leave for the United States are often made quickly. A gang will threaten a student and/or his family, and there is little time to plan. They must leave home immediately or face consequences, often death. These kids arrive in the US and speak little English, and have had to begin a new life overnight. They're often living with relatives they hardly know, or renting a room from friends. Many are balancing work and school for survival.

This week, I heard the story of a teen in the US who lost his asylum case and will be ordered to return to his home country. One official who works with "returnees" in El Salvador said, "I don't know how the gangs know that these kids are returned, but they do. Many are targeted--and dead--within 24 hours of arriving back home."

For many of us, immigration has become simply a political issue. We fail to see the faces or know the names of those affected. To me, the issue affects Carole, David, Melisa, Enrique, Josue....

The next time you read or hear something about the "problem" of immigration, take a moment to think about the immigrants you know, and put a name and face to "the issue." Ask yourself, how might this affect \_\_\_\_? It may change your perspective.
