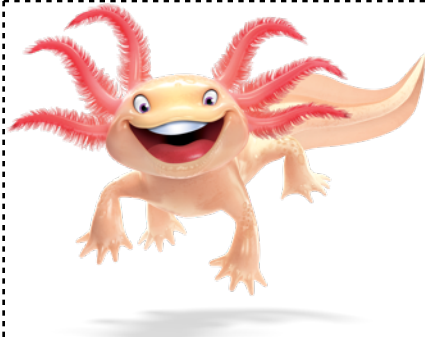

MISSION FOCUS

Human Trafficking

Human trafficking is the trade in humans, usually for forced labor or to provide services. Human trafficking, which may be within a country or trans-nationally, is a crime against the person. On an international level it is condemned as a violation of human rights. The economic impact of human trafficking is shocking. Every year the human trafficking industry generates 32 billion dollars according to estimates from the International Labour Organization. The UN says human trafficking is the fastest-growing criminal enterprise in the world. Almost every country in the world is affected by human trafficking.

The Cooperative Baptist Fellowship (CBF) addresses human trafficking through their Mission Community of Justice and Peacemaking. A major focus of some field personnel is working with trafficked humans. Aaron and Stephanie Glenn, CBF field personnel based in the Los Angeles area, advocate and care for survivors of human trafficking. They see their ministry as offering acute care on an individual level and acting as **Connectors** between individuals and needed resources including churches.

The CBF Community of Justice and Peacemaking partners with organizations to address issues such as human trafficking. In I John 3:16-19 we are urged to "love, not in word or speech but in truth or action". Our response may follow a pattern of:

Engage in the global work of CBF by joining the Justice and Peacemaking Community. Multiple opportunities to serve nationally and internationally are available.

Give Ministries are made possible through financial support by individuals and churches.

Pray regularly for CBF ministries and CBF personnel. The CBF Prayer Guide, "Prayers of the People" (copies in the vestibule) lists multiple needs of prayer. Answer your call to support CBF ministries and CBF field personnel.

A remarkable example of someone's living a "theology of enough" daily is John Wesley, the founder of Methodism. When Wesley was young, he calculated that he needed twenty-eight pounds a year to live (about \$65). Since inflation was basically unknown then, he kept his level of expenditures at the same twenty-eight pounds a year for the rest of his life. Wesley's income, however, changed dramatically--from 30 pounds a year to up to 1400 pounds a year! The 1,372 pounds extra he gave away! What an incredible example of faith applied to one's economic life!

LOVE YOUR NEIGHBOR--STEP BY STEP

April 29-May 3

William Chewning is spearheading this effort to bless our neighbor. William's sense of God's call to his neighbor's need originated when he re-connected to a long-time friend, Mary Lindsay, through OBC's hosting of Mission Madness. It was a weekend in March when OBC hosted 200 youth from 15 churches across Virginia. The youth fanned out over Orange County to do small projects for residents. One of the residents was Mary Lindsay. William was the site leader for that project. He noticed that Mary's home needed much more than what the youth were able to accomplish in one weekend.

Scope of work includes a complete renovation of the kitchen and one bathroom, and graveling the driveway. The work is being done according to County building codes and will pass inspection.

Others involved with this endeavor are Jerry McClarey (master electrician), David Brizzolara (plumbing), Jimmy Kestner (floor plan drawings), Steve Sedwick (kitchen design), Jeff Foster (hauling gravel and), Luck Stone (donating driveway materials).

OBC members are also helping with the labor, preparation of meals for the workers, checking on Mary Lindsay and her family who are residing at the Chewnings' home while work is being done.

William also is seeking the assistance of OBC members who have interior decorating skills. With a gleam in his eye he says, "We want the finished work to not only be constructed well, but appealing to the eye."

Overall budget for the effort will be approximately \$10,000 above and beyond several in-kind contributions. Your monetary contributions can be made through OBC to a designated fund, "Love Your Neighbor." A list of supplies needed and their costs is available if you would like to donate specific building materials.

William is quick to say, "This is not about me. This is about a prayer that Mrs. Lindsay has been praying for more than 25 years. She needed help. We are merely the instruments of the Lord in answering her prayer."
